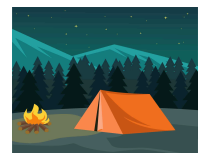
The 2025 HCW Annual Picnic was a great afternoon for the families in the community. Thank you to everyone who helped with the fun.

Changes are coming to San Diego's Trash and Recycling Collection Service

Under the new system single-family homeowners will pay for those services. A cost breakdown is available on the City's website. Broken bins will be replaced at no additional charge, and customers can save money by opting for a smaller trash bin, effective once the new containers are rolled out, which will start in October. Additional information is being mailed out to homeowners by the City in July. For more information, customers

July fun facts: The birthstone for July is the ruby, which symbolizes passion, love, and contentment. The birth flower for July is the larkspur, which represents strong bonds of love and an open heart. July is named after Julius Caesar, the Roman statesman and general, who was born in the month.

The United States celebrates its Independence Day on July 4th; a US holiday in commemoration of July 4, 1776, the day on which the original 13 colonies of the United States declared independence from British rule. Americans eat around 150 million hot dogs on Independence Day, which costs them around \$104.7 million for the dogs and \$70.4 million for the buns. The tradition of setting off fireworks on the 4th of July was originally suggested by John Adams, who envisioned the celebration of Independence with great fanfare, including fireworks. Adams expressed his hopes for the annual celebration in a letter to his wife Abigail on July 3, 1776, anticipating future celebrations across the nation.

This vision materialized for the first time on July 4, 1777, in Philadelphia, where the day was marked with a grand display of fireworks, setting a precedent that endures to this day.
